Donation of a Pre-World War II Stearman Aircraft to Scottsdale Airport

#### **UPDATE**

- October 19, 2016 Airport Advisory Commission Meeting:
   Airport Advisory Commission unanimously approved a motion to recommend to the City Council adoption of Resolution 10607, authorizing contract 2016-167-COS
- November 14, 2016 City Council Meeting:
   Resolution to authorize contract 2016-167-COS and approve the use of City
   CIP general contingency funds was continued to a future City Council meeting;
  - Council request for staff to bring back a plan outlining the itemized costs and funding options which may include Public Arts Program and/or Tourism Development funds

#### **UPDATE**

- Staff discussions regarding alternative funding:
   Discussions occurred between Assistant City Manager and Public Art
   Director; Public Art has committed \$180,000 for the public art portion of the Terminal Redevelopment project;
  - · The memorial shade plaza project elements are not considered public art
- December 20, 2016 Tourism Development Commission: Thunderbird Field II Veterans' Memorial, Inc. – Funding Request: Tourism Development Funds
  - TDC denied a funding request (4-3) to support design and construction of the memorial shade plaza in the amount of \$412,500

#### **KEY CONSIDERATIONS**

- The Donor shall pay for all the costs associated with the purchase and restoration of the aircraft to make it installation-ready (\$120,000), as well as monument plaques to complement the aircraft display (\$50,000)
- The proposed funding options for the design and construction costs may include City CIP general contingency funds, Tourism Development funds or a combination of the two (\$412,500)

#### **KEY CONSIDERATIONS**

- The Donor must have the entire cost of the aircraft either committed or on deposit with the contractor restoring the aircraft by April 1, 2017
- The Donor shall be responsible to cover the costs for the maintenance and upkeep of the aircraft based on estimates provided by the aircraft restorer of \$3,000 annually
- The City shall pay for all costs associated with landscape services and utility services necessary to surround and display the aircraft, and to provide insurance using Aviation Funds
