Mayor’s Report – Mayor Ortega announced the Mayor’s Constitutional Day contest is open to all 1st through 12th grade Scottsdale students. He invited students to submit entries using any medium, including haiku, paintings, or illustrations before the September 16, 2022 deadline. Mayor Ortega asked for a moment of silent reflection for the people of Ukraine as they fight for their freedom, survival, and democracy. Mayor Ortega read a proclamation declaring the month of September as Childhood Cancer Awareness Month.

City Manager’s Report – Acting City Manager Bill Murphy introduced a “Fast Five” video produced by the City Communication’s Office which provided updates on several City events and offerings.

Presentations/Information Updates – McDowell Sonoran Conservancy Chief Executive Officer Justin Owen gave a PowerPoint presentation.

Public Comment – Diana Smith noted areas of deterioration that need to be repaired including street signs, light poles, and pillars in the Downtown area. Barney Gonzales suggested the city implement an application permit process for developers to assess expected landscape water usage associated with projects and suggested alternate methods for shading including canopies, low water usage trees, and architectural design elements.

- **Schedule a future discussion related to potential creation of funds for new affordable housing.**
- **Ensure the importance of community green spaces, such as public parks and our downtown civic space, are considered in the Heat Mitigation Plan.**
- **Create a thermal map of the McDowell Sonoran Preserve and other open spaces.**
