CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Lisa Borowsky called to order a Regular Meeting and Work Study Session of the Scottsdale City Council at 5:03 P.M. on Tuesday, May 5, 2026, in the City Hall Kiva Forum.

Daniel Friedman, Scottsdale resident, spoke in support of the Shea Blvd. and N. 66th Street HAWK.

Ariella Friedman, Scottsdale resident, spoke in support of the Shea Blvd. and N. 66th Street HAWK.

Paris Blumenthal, Scottsdale resident, spoke in support of the Shea Blvd. and N. 66th Street HAWK.

Benjamin Benson, Scottsdale resident, spoke in support of the Shea Blvd. and N. 66th Street HAWK.

Mark Rentz, Scottsdale resident, spoke in support of a diverse water portfolio, the Advanced Purification Recycled Water (APRW) Program, the Bartlett Dam expansion, and the need for a contingency plan for a reduction in the Colorado River water allowance.

Jason Alexander, Scottsdale resident, spoke in opposition to the Shea Blvd. and N. 66th Street HAWK.

Linda Milhaven, former Scottsdale City Councilmember, spoke in support of water options outlined in the Water Strategic Plan and stated the APRW Program and Bartlett Dam expansion should be included in the CIP budget.

Gila Lesky, Scottsdale resident, spoke in support of the Shea Blvd. and N. 66th Street HAWK.

Dan Ishac, Scottsdale resident, spoke in opposition to the Shea Blvd. and N. 66th Street HAWK.

David Smith, former Scottsdale City Councilmember, spoke in opposition to multiple CIP projects citing Proposition 420 budget limitations.

Raoul Zubia, Scottsdale resident, spoke in support of the APRW Program and Bartlett Dam expansion.

Yvonne Cahill, Scottsdale resident, spoke in opposition to the Shea Blvd. and N. 66th Street HAWK and stated an overpass bridge would be a better option for this area.

Mayor Borowsky closed public comment on this item.

Councilmembers made the following requests, observations and suggestions:

- Provide a list of Parks and Preserve project budgets that were removed from the CIP and were budgeted for design.
- Schedule a presentation and discussion of the Water Strategic Plan for a future City Council Work Study Session Meeting.
- Request for more information related to the \$100 million set aside for water and how that funding would be utilized and possibly added back to the CIP either through a memo to the City Council or a future Work Study Session Meeting.
- Request for a discussion on the APRW Program and related costs at a future Work Study Session Meeting.
- Request for a discussion of other possible water purchase options at a future Work Study Session Meeting.
- Request for a discussion of a feasibility study for Bartlett Dam at a future Work Study Session Meeting.
- Should be flexible and be able to adjust our water policy.
- Should discuss and publicize what other current methods the City is using to save water.
- Need to anticipate costs so that water rates and fees reflect future needs.
- Concern that the 5th Avenue and Goldwater Park project was defunded.
- Request for the City Attorney to investigate resident concerns related to certain CIP projects and possible issues related to Proposition 420 funding.
- Concern about a possible lack of transparency related to the proposed Shea Blvd. and 66th Street HAWK project.
- Would prefer a traffic light at Shea Blvd. and 66th Street instead of a HAWK as a HAWK poses a danger to pedestrians.

- Request a written description of when Shea Blvd. and 66th Street HAWK project was proposed and what projects were eliminated.
- Kierland Commons HAWK is successful.
- A HAWK at Shea Blvd. and 66th Street would return the traffic lights at Shea and 64th Street and 70th Street to normal intervals.
- Overall, this is a good budget.
- Concern that CIP spending is down.
- Appreciate the increases to the road maintenance budget.
- Revenue estimates are too conservative.
- Budget is fiscally conservative.
- Rainy day funds are needed.
- Want to keep promises to Police and Fire regarding salaries and ensure that roads are maintained.
- Concerns regarding reduction of employee count and contracting work out.
- Need to invest in water as time is running out.
- Would like budget funding for Bartlett Dam expansion as water costs will only increase.
- Need more diversity in our water sources.
- Glad to see that the budget was reduced by 10 percent.
- Would like unfilled vacancy count to go down further.
- Crime is significantly down.
- Debt has been paid down.
- Appreciate investment in new training for existing Public Safety team members.
- Appreciate investments in roads while reducing overall budget.

- Review 2004 Preserve Tax to see if the tax can be repurposed for other city needs.
- Review 2019 Bond projects to see what are needed as compared to what was proposed seven years ago.
- City staff should be able to present to the Budget Review Commission.
- The development and methodology of revenue projections should be reviewed to ensure the budget accurately reflects expenses.

- Appreciate the efforts of the BRC members.
- Bring a resolution for City Council consideration and possible adoption related to the Budget Review Commission recommendations

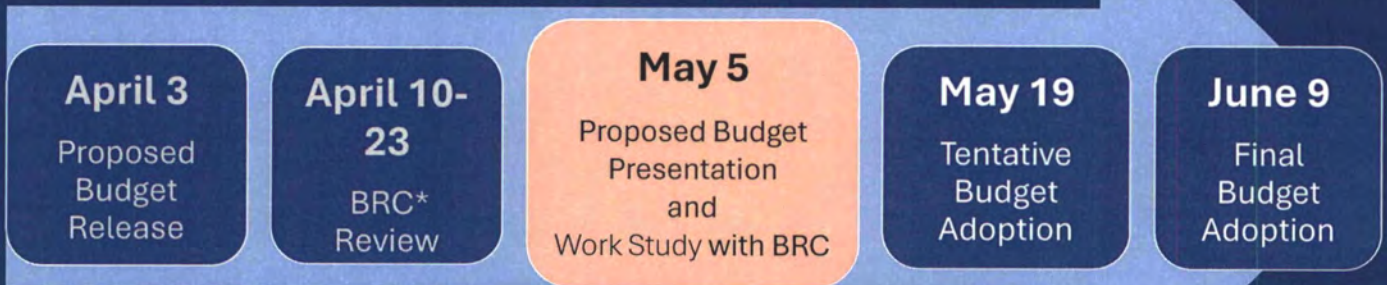

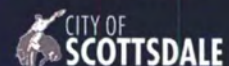

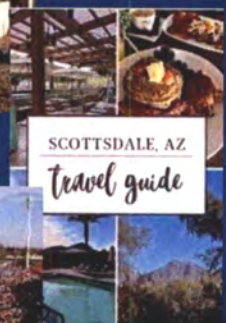

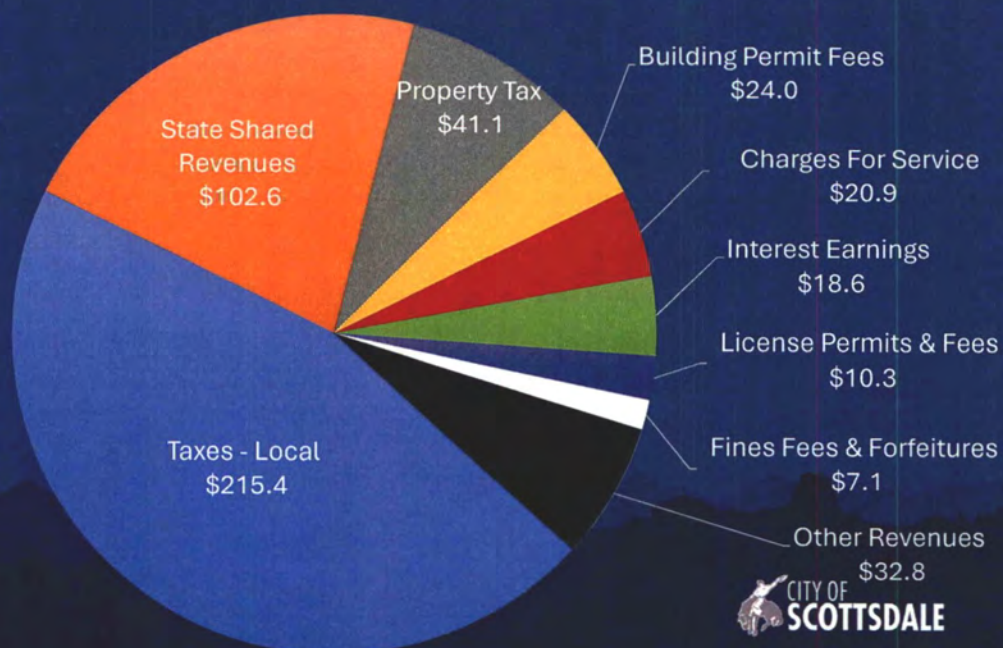

General Fund Revenues

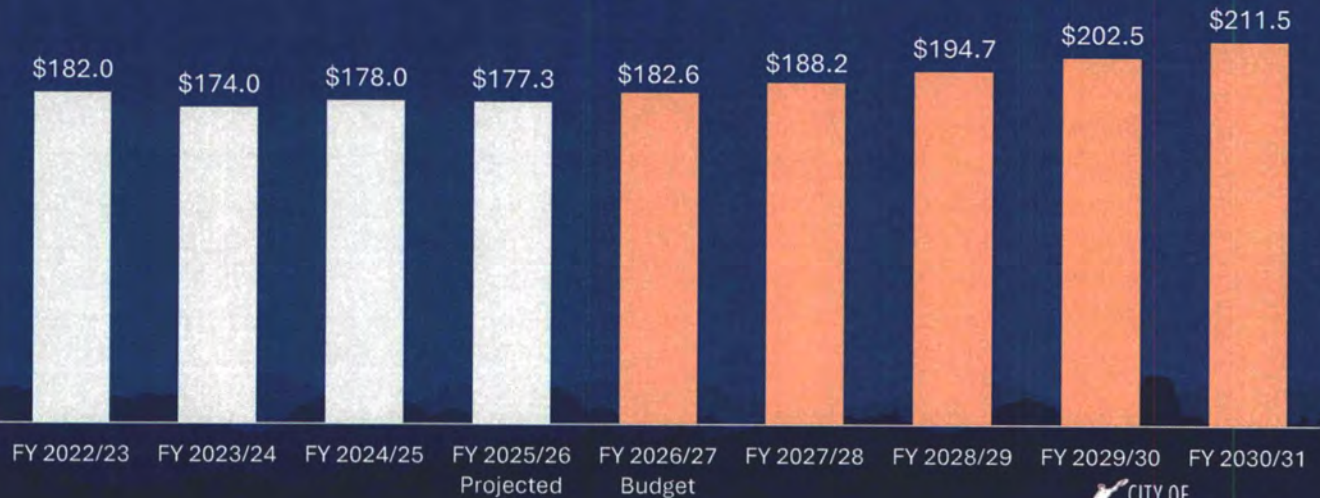
FY26/27 Projected General Fund Sources (in millions)

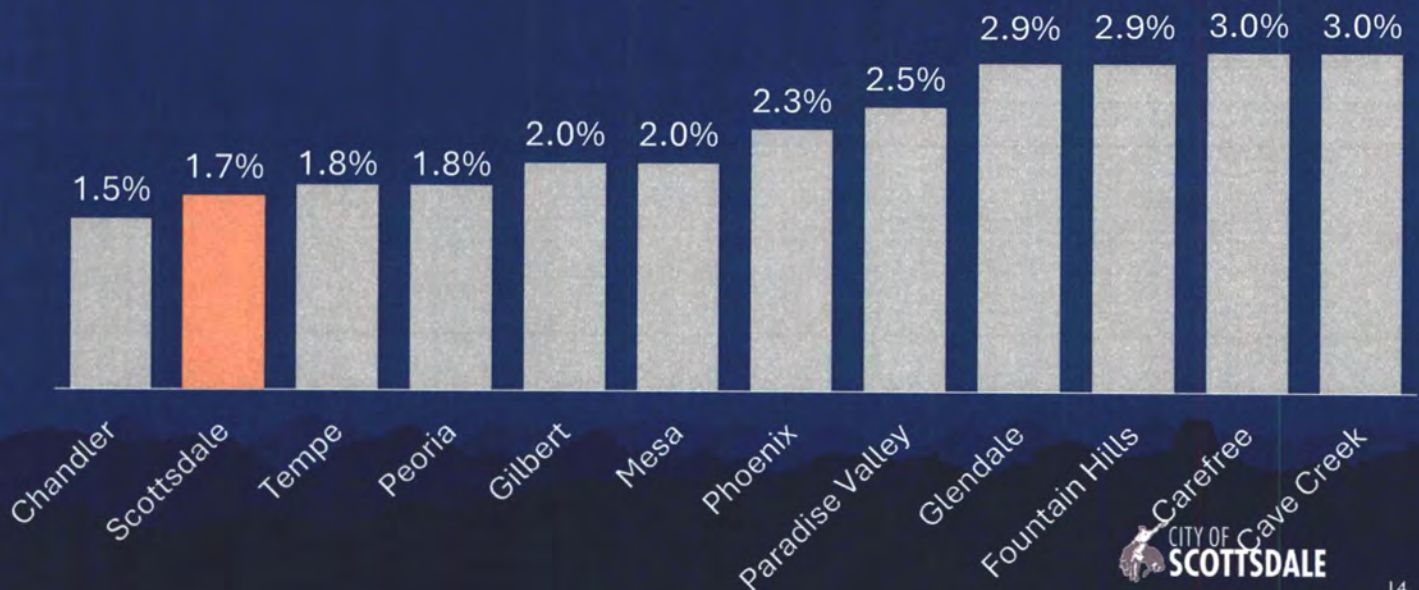


Sales Tax – Slower Growth in FY27 and FY28

General Fund 1.0% Sales Tax Revenues (in millions)



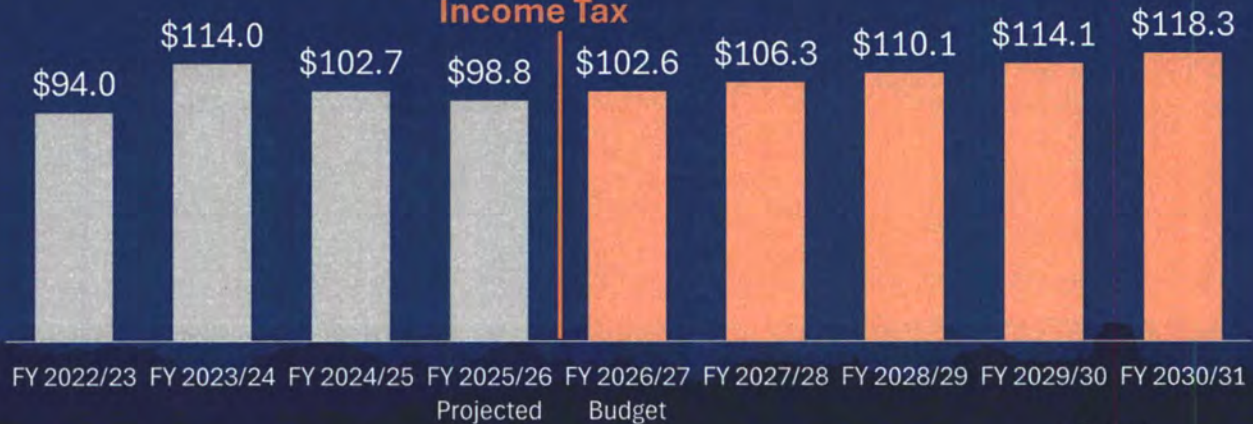
Scottsdale Maintains One of the Lowest Local Sales Tax Rate in the Valley

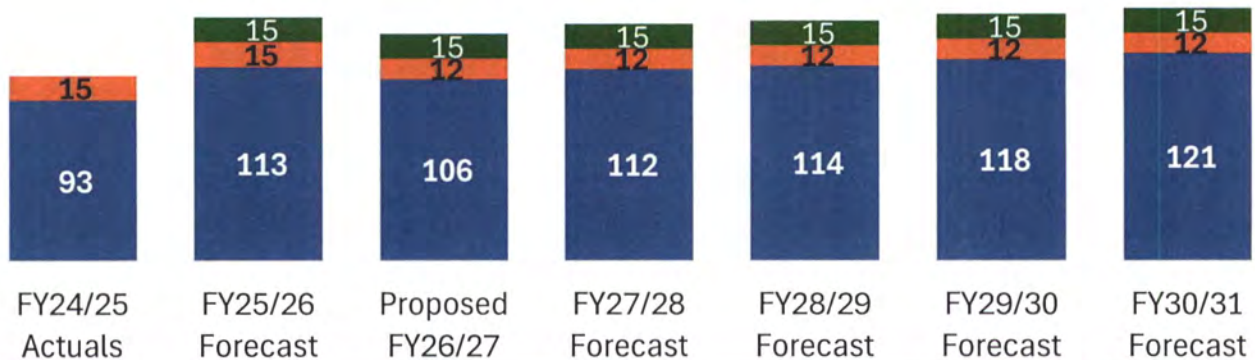

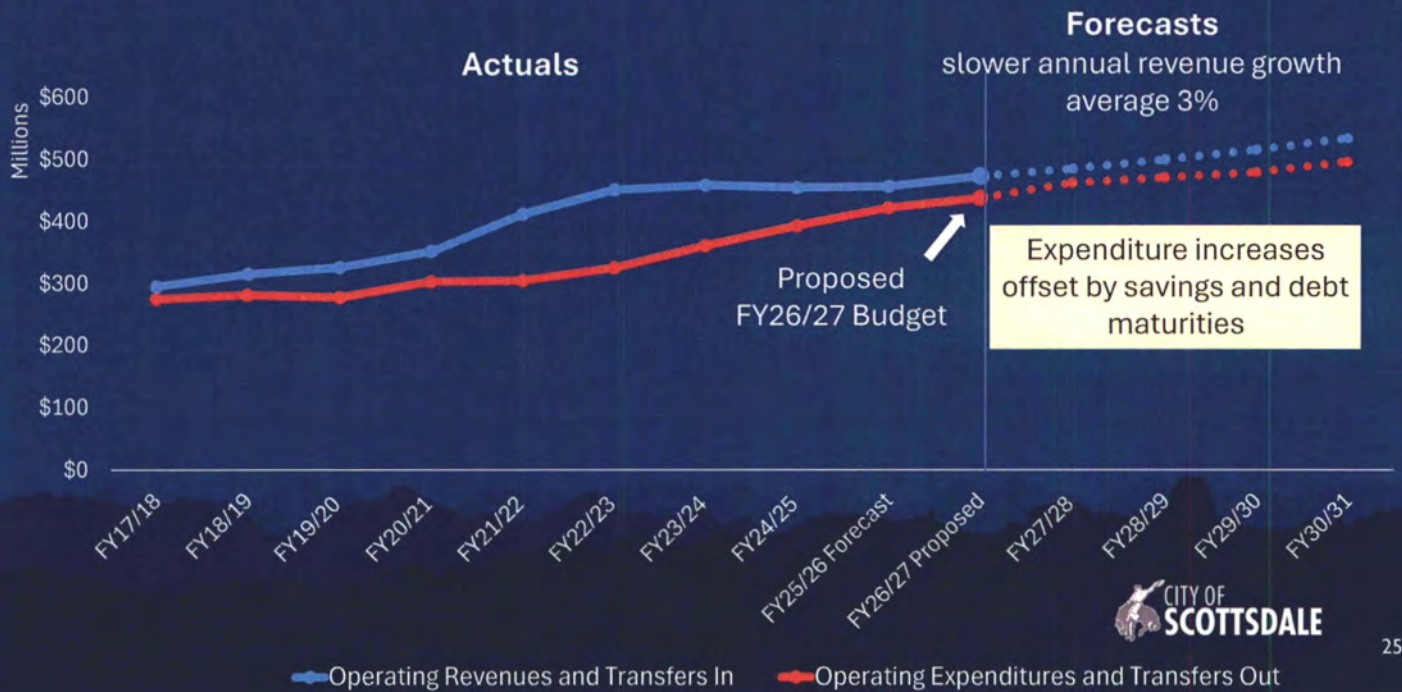

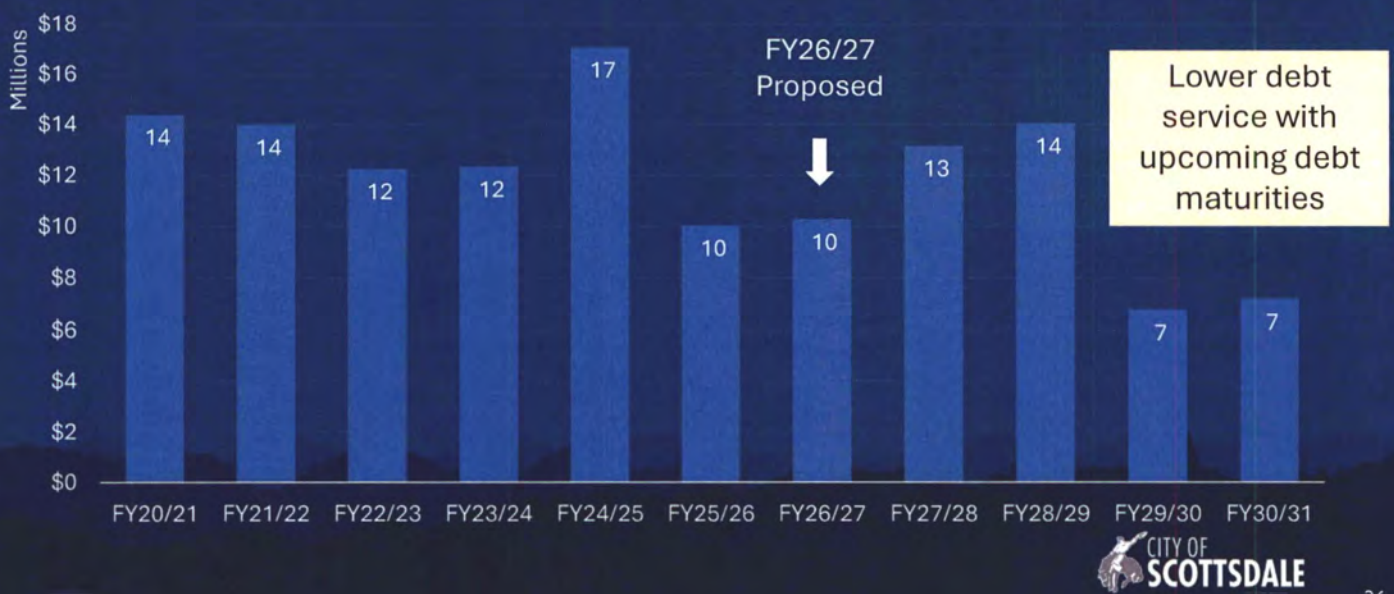

General Fund – On-Going Operating Sources and Uses (excludes PSPRS Additional Payments and Transfers to CIP)

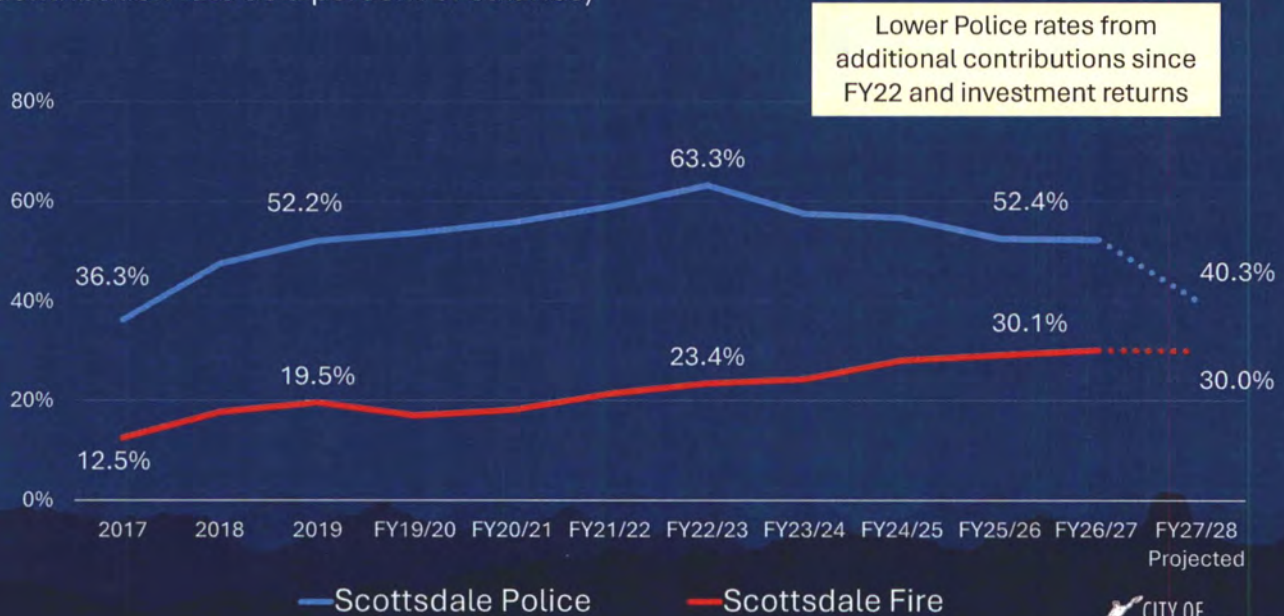


General Fund Transfers to Debt Service

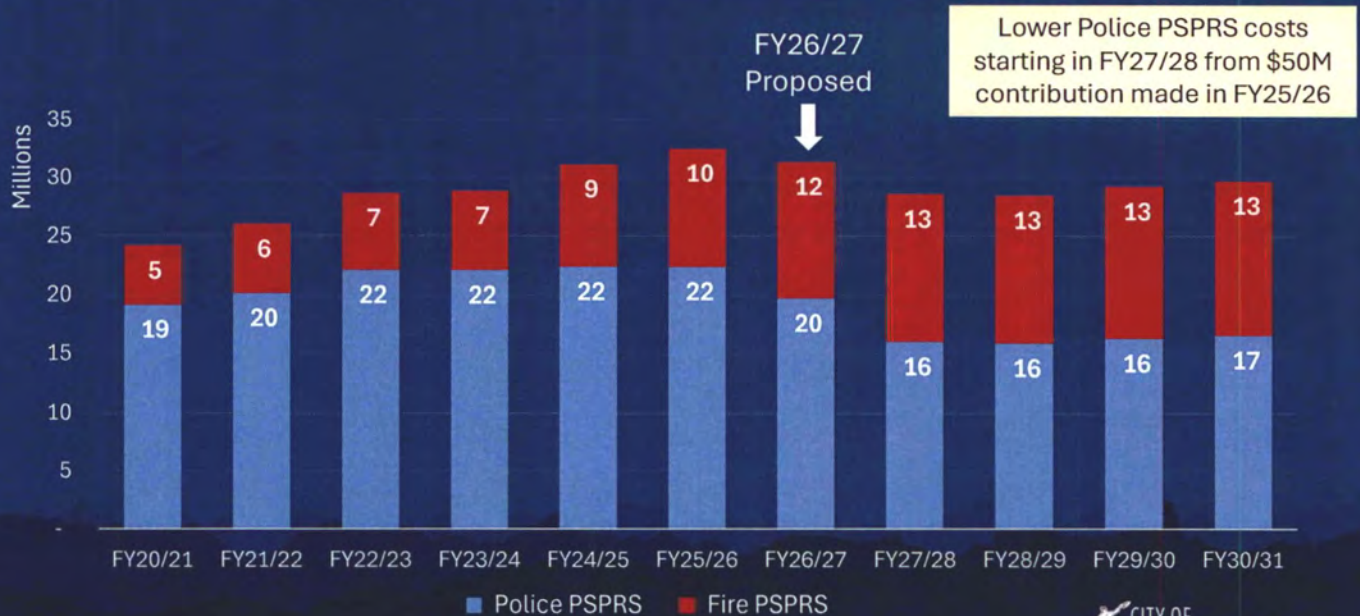


Scottsdale's PSPRS Contribution Rate for T1/T2

(Contribution rate as a percent of salaries)



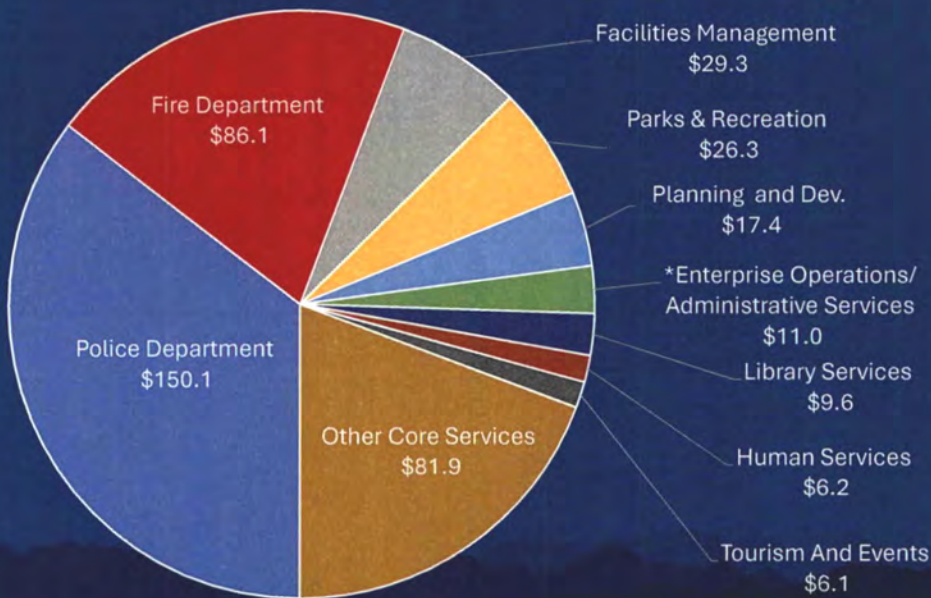
PSPRS Historical Costs and Projected Savings

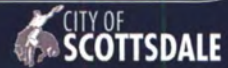

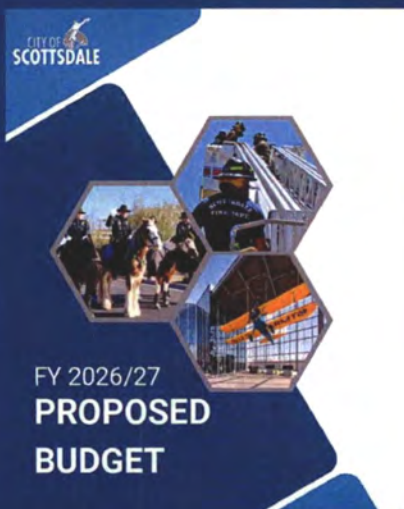

1. Sales Tax Structure Review

- Voter-mandated sales tax revenue categories have aged and may not align proportionally with actual spending needs across the city
- Request staff evaluate the gap between mandated revenues/allocations and real demand—identifying trapped surpluses and structural deficits.
- Recommend areas where the sales tax structure should be realigned proportionally to fund major community priorities.

No new or incremental taxes proposed—overall sales tax burden remains unchanged. And any structural change would require a voter referendum.



Description on Proposed Future Areas of Focus for BRC

2. 2004 Preserve Tax - Repurpose

- Prior to the FY28/29 Budget Cycle, request staff to evaluate for review and recommendation to BRC and Council 1) the payoff the McDowell Sonoran Preserve debt when it becomes eligible and 2) the repurposing of the 0.15% sales tax that expires in 2034 to major road/water/drainage maintenance programs to renew city's infrastructure backbone.
