### **INVOCATION**

Councilwoman Graham: Mayor thank you so much. I am pleased to invite Father Fred to the lectern to administer the invocation. If I could have a few moments to talk about Father Fred and his ministry. Father Fred currently serves as pastor of St. Bernard in Clairvaux, a priest of the diocese of Phoenix, he was ordained June 1995 after completing his theological studies at St. John's seminary in California. We're so grateful that Father Fred is here to administer tonight's invocation, and we welcome him and ask him to begin when he's ready. Thank you, Father Fred.

#### **MAYOR'S REPORT**

For the Mayor's Report, I have something I would like to share, bright spot, at least in the world of the Salt River horses that you probably have all heard a lot about. I would like to take a moment to recognize this important development regarding the Salt River horses.

After, I guess it's the last couple of years of threats that were made against the herd out at the Salt River I'm sure everyone knows about them but they are such an asset and tourism draw for the area, and, you know, historical part of the community, really, and they were under siege, really, from efforts that wanted to thin the herd, to a degree that would have been quite dramatic, and I, along with a number of passionate individuals, you know, worked to bring this to the forefront and and in particular, bring this to the governor's attention, imploring her to stop this action. And last week, we learned that there will be a at least a hold, two-year pause on the decision to remove a good portion of the herd. And in fact, the removals are stopped at least for the time being. I'm thrilled to report this.

There were a lot of people involved, wild horse rescues in this effort, state legislatures, in particular representative Cody Reim who is new to the job and he has just been incredible at that. Thank you to, Cody for his involvement. And long-term protection remains important. I will continue to be as involved as possible to to help with that effort, and the goal should be simple, preserve a healthy genetically viable herd while respecting the wishes of the overwhelming number of Arizonans who have deep appreciation for for the animals, the horses that live out this.

So very exciting news for me. I thought I would share that with all of our horse lovers out there. Yeah, good news. A little bit of good news. Save the horses.

**PUBLIC COMMENT**

And moving on to the non-agendized public comment, this comment period is reserved for citizens, business owners and property owners to comment on non-agendized items that are within the Council's jurisdiction. No official Council action shall be taken on any of the items that the speakers address and you are limited to three minutes to address the Council. If you haven't registered to speak, please see

the city clerk if you wish to.

I have three people on the non-agendized public comment, Dan Ishac, Mark Renz, and Andrew Wollman. Dan Ishac.

Dan Ishac: I wasn't prepared for that speedy of a call. Several quick topics. First, the trolley. I understand that there is some concern about the contract and there is a lawsuit associated with it. I know nothing about it but I want to point out that I have been at the Via Linda Senior Center 30, 40 times and never seen a single rider on the north branch. So, I want to know whether the city ever did a study, to see whether this should be an alternative. I understand the south trail is actually used more often, but the north trail seems to be empty every time. Literally I can count on both hands the number of people I have ever seen on the north branch of that service. I don't understand why we are spending millions of dollars on something that is not benefiting our residents.

Second, at the July meeting, there was a call to put a work study on water. Adam Kwasman said, let's find out what the feds are doing. The fed has spoken. Our city manager said, oh, but the August meetings are so busy. We can't do it in August. Yesterday and's today's meeting have virtually nothing on it. I don't know why we have scheduled it yet. It ties into Barry Graham mentioning said we should not be kicking things down the can. And he was talking about the road conditions although we are not kicking the can down the road, although the deterioration happened while he was on the Transportation Committee and on Council as well as Kathy Littlefield being on Council the entire time.

But if we don't believe in kicking the can down the road, hy did we remove all funding for anything water related for this budget? It seems hypocritical to talk about our roads while we kick the can down the road with regard to water.

Flock cameras. I understand why there's so much angst on Flock cameras. Flock screwed up. They didn't put restrictions. They didn't put data timing and things like that. Flock cameras are important for safety of our residents. Let's make sure that we protect the privacy and the rights of our citizens but not create additional crime in Scottsdale. And let's help our police do their job.

Yesterday Jan Dubauskas made comments about not needing public comments at the beginning. She talked about her and Kathy Littlefield having office hours before meetings and nobody shows up. Jan, I understand you are an attorney and numbers are not your thing. That to suggest a non-random sample of your supporters reflects what our needs are is just absurd. We have thousands of people who said they don't like you Jan and they won't show up for your office hours. It was just an absurd statement.

And then lastly, I want to go on record, it's absurd for our city to be spending thousands of dollars to send a Councilmember to Taiwan so that she can pad her resume. We have the Mayor there. We have our Director of Economic Development. There is no need for Jan to be there. It is a boondoggle. Stop this nonsense. Thank you.

Mayor Borowsky: Thank you. Okay. Moving on to Mark Rentz, and lastly, Andrew Wollman.

Mark Rentz: Good evening, Mayor, Councilmembers my name is Mark Rentz, I'm speaking on a couple of quick matters, if that's already. We are on the public comment, aren't we?

Mayor Borowsky: Non-agendized, yes, indeed. I know it's gone very, very fast.

Mark Rentz: Okay. All right to proceed then?

Mayor Borowsky: So it's early.

Mark Rentz: Thank you very much for your indulgence. I have two issues I wanted to bring to your attention of concern to me. The first the first issue is the matter regarding the relocating in the agenda of the public comment period and the citizens petitions. I'm a fortunate guy. I'm retired. So, I can come and stay here as long as I want, as long as I let my golden retriever out before I leave the house. But the it's very difficult for a lot of our citizens to sit around here on some meetings for two to three hours and not be able to comment.

I would like to encourage, so my suggestion is I encourage the City Council to reconsider its decision on on moving the citizens comments and the citizens petition back earlier in the schedule so we can have a chance to participate with you, share our thoughts with you, and have the opportunity to provide information that may be of value to you as you work on various issues. So that's my first issue.

My second issue is one that I'm sure all of us are well aware of, it's been in the press almost every day. Heck it even made national news with David Muir, I think Thursday evening or Wednesday evening, I'm not sure which day. And that's the concern regarding the Colorado River supply and its impacts on the on the city of Scottsdale. As you know, the last week in April, I submitted a petition to this to the City Council. In that petition, I asked you to reconsider your deletion of a line item of specific funding for maintaining and expanding the public the Scottsdale renewable water or recycled water program that had been pushed to the side in a previous decision. I think it should be, if it's not already, it should be incumbent to you all that we are in a water crisis. I know some people refuse to accept that reality, but I guarantee you, B.O.R., Bureau of Reclamation knows we are in crisis. 760,000-acre feet of water is a crisis.

And we have an opportunity with our own water, not buying water, that's probably gonna have to happen anyways as we diversify and cover the shortage. But with our own water, we have an opportunity to recycle it and use it. It's already been paid for. Thank you very much.

Mayor Borowsky: Thank you, Mark.

Mark Rentz: One last comment I did want to make regarding my petition. I have not gotten any type of response from you, Madam Mayor or from your staff regarding that petition, and it's been three months.

Mayor Borowsky: Okay. That's I'm just going to respond to that. That's directed to the city manager. So, we'll follow up on that. Thank you so much. Okay. Next, we have Andrew Wollman.

Andrew Wollman: Does that work? Do we know how to turn this on?

Mayor Borowsky: Good afternoon, are you trying to use the Elmo, the overhead?

Andrew Wollman: Yes, I'm pushing the power button, but it ain't I'm pressing this. I guess we just made it difficult enough that we didn't use it. I guess we will go without it. All right. It's not okay. Do you think it will work?

Madam Mayor, Councilmembers, I was prompted yesterday after watching the Council meeting to talk about public comment. Today, I'm asking to you create a public comment period that provides meaningful residential feedback rather than a forum for reputational attacks aimed at influencing public opinion and elections.

Today I want to present three examples of how public comment can cross the line and suggest a solution to fix this problem: Everyone knows Dan Ishac. He's at every meeting. He made a case for moving comments to the end of the meetings. His commentary appears to be politically motivated. Mr. Ishac is leading a recall effort against Jan Dubauskas, has challenged Kathy Littlefield's vote, and repeatedly attacked Barry Graham and Adam Kwasman. His comments towards Whitehead, McAllen and Mayor have been markedly different. Consider that when weighing comments, also consider the demeanor, inside and outside the Kiva. Mr. Ishac once complained that we were comments by a Councilmember about his body or attire were inappropriate. That graphic is Mr. Ishac own online response with someone who disagreed with him, I redacted one word because this meeting is televised, but I think you will see that this is not the words of a mature individual. And we are listening to advice from him, and that's a sad, sad statement.

Next, another individual, who isn't here today but he was here last night, is Jason Alexander. Jason Alexander, his own resume, lists him as he says he works with politicians, candidates and private parties, engaged in business initiatives. He's a political communications strategist. I asked Jason repeatedly if he has any connection to Axon or any of its PACs or any of its principles and he refuses to answer, yet he comes in here and acts like he's a normal citizen where he does have a definite agenda and that does not promote any good relations in this Council.

Lastly, and sadly, this is what the Mayor posted the day before election. The Mayor is supposed to be making the Council work together. We talk about civility in the Council and yet the day before the

election, the Mayor said vote for anyone but Barry. Sounds like something I did in grade school, when I didn't want a certain person to win. My ex-girlfriend. I don't think we're in grade school anymore. The Mayor has called for civility, yet her own public attacks on Barry Graham contribute to the discord that she wants to reduce. I'm sure you don't want me to go on.

Mayor Borowsky: You know, I'm sure you can come back and talk more. Thank you very much.

Andrew Wollman: I will come back. Thank you.

Mayor Borowsky: All right that. That concludes non-agendized public comment.

**MAYOR AND COUNCIL - ITEM 11**

And moving on to Mayor and Council, we have no Citizen Petitions, by the way. Mayor and Council items 11 and 12 were my additions. I will talk briefly, just an explanation of what they are.

The first one, item 11 is a request to direct the city manager or responsible charter officers to agendize a work study session, discussion related to the possible expansion of water conservation incentives, including ideas such as hot water circulator programs where we either collaborate with with other nonprofits or what have you to incentivize things like hot water circulators, continue to invest in turf reduction programs, update the rainwater harvesting ordinance that I think was last updated in 1996, look at incentivizing smart meter irrigation controllers and explore, as I just mentioned potential partnerships, to work together with rebate funding through organizations like Salt River Project and Central Arizona Project.

And the, I want to just point out that I, I have asked. I think someone mentioned this earlier, but I have asked three times during an open meeting, through a Mayor agenda or whatever item we were talking about, to have a public meeting where we're openly discussing all of our water, our water options. And I know it's in the works, but I think sooner is rather is better than later. And I hope that we have that on a very near agenda. And this would roll right into that.

And so I'm going ask the Council, I will make a motion to agendize this to the next available meeting together with a ideally the work study session that we'll be having. I will make a motion to do that.

Vice Mayor McAllen: Second.

Ben Lane: Mayor, I apologize, we have one speaker.

Mayor Borowsky: Oh yeah, that's right. And I always forget the speakers. Mark Rentz. Thank you for reminding me.

Vice Mayor McAllen: He already spoke.

Mayor Borowsky: Mark Rentz. You're good? All right. So, does anyone have any questions or comments? No? I'm gonna call for the vote. Sorry, Councilwoman Dubauskas.

Councilwoman Duabuskas: I agree. I think I think in the conversations that we've had, I assumed it was going to be sort of a broad discussion about water.

Mayor Borowsky: Yes, exactly.

Councilwoman Duabuskas: And this is more detailed about what the broadness could include.

Mayor Borowsky: Exactly I wanted to add this to the discussion, I think it's very important.

Councilwoman Duabuskas: Okay. Sounds good.

Mayor Borowsky: And Councilwoman Whitehead.

Councilwoman Whitehead: I was just going to add that there was a request in the past, we have charts that show where we are on rebates for the various types especially turf is always of interest. So, where we are in terms of how this year's turf rebates compare with past years and so that will be helpful to have as and other conservation efforts. You know, I will have to go back and look at what Brian used to give us annually, but we had charts showing where we were, saving water and how the city itself, in terms of water usage and then generally the city outside of the city government water usage. So that would be helpful to have before that meeting. Thanks.

Mayor Borowsky: All right. This' a motion and a there's a motion and a second. Please register your vote.

Thank you for your support on this, and I look forward to this meeting that hopefully will be scheduled very soon. All right.

**MAYOR AND COUNCIL - ITEM 12**

Item number 12, the city's public safety the safety plan ordinance. So, there's been an uptick recently brewing, I would say, over the last year, of criminal activity at sometimes very, very serious in the Old Town area. And so I like the city attorney together, of course, with the chief of police, and his department, to look at presenting a work study session on the options, including what the current requirements are, how we can potentially improve and enhance public safety, including such things as requiring training, training and certification for security personnel that work that work in these series, I guess it would be series 12 liquor, series 12 businesses in an effort to try to get ahead or get you know, rein some of these activities that are going on in the Old Town area.

And so I'm asking for a work study session, just that, to discuss options and how we enhance and strengthen our public safety requirements in that area. City attorney.

City Attorney Luis Santaella: Mayor, members of Council, I would like to clarify, we have an existing public safety plan ordinance that is not liquor establishment specific. It's specific to types different types of venues that we've determined previously are somewhat high risk. So, this item wouldn't be specific to any sort of liquor series 6 or 12.

Mayor Borowsky: Okay.

Luis Santaella: It's those establishments that currently have public safety plans in place and licenses.

Mayor Borowsky: And there's a relationship between liquor license and the public safety plans.

Luis Santaella: Often, yes, but it's not unique to liquor licenses.

Mayor Borowsky: Thank you. Where it's deemed appropriate according to the public safety plan ordinance. I will make a motion to put this on the agenda for it doesn't have to be a work study session, at the discretion of the city attorney, it could just be an agenda item. So, either or. I will make that motion.

Councilwoman Littlefield: I will second that motion.

Mayor Borowsky: Okay. Councilman Kwasman, thank you.

Councilman Kwasman: Thank you, Madam Mayor. Madam Mayor, I'm not against this at all, but we have a Public Safety Committee. Why don't we why don't you come and have a have the presentation go through the Public Safety Committee because that's why we have the Public Safety Committee. I mean to have to discuss these things. As a member of the Public Safety Committee, this is this is what we go over all the time.

Mayor Borowsky: Is it on your agenda?

Councilman Kwasman: I'm not the Chairman of the Public Safety Committee.

Mayor Borowsky: Do you know if it's on your agenda?

Councilman Kwasman: I don't know if it's on the agenda but I'm sure the Chair of the committee would literally put it on the top of the agenda. I would support that as well.

Luis Santaella: Mayor, I think that would work in the sense we'll take it to the Public Safety Committee, get their input, work it through whatever work product comes out of there, we'll bring it to the City Council at a future date, either as a work study session or an actual ordinance improvement depending on what the Public Safety Committee thinks.

Mayor Borowsky: Yeah. That sounds great.

Councilwoman Littlefield: Sounds good.

Mayor Borowsky: And I would prefer the latter because I don't even know if warrants a work study. Your recommendations are going to be, I think an agenda item would be better. Okay. Motion and a second. Assuming that's okay with the second.

Councilman Kwasman: And what is the why would we I guess we should agendize it for the further meeting but pending the recommendations of the Public Safety Committee?

Mayor Borowsky: Following the public safety.

Councilman Kwasman: Yeah. Yeah.

Luis Santaella: That works. Number one says direct the city manager or responsible charter officer to agendaize the item for a future meeting. It doesn't take a City Council Meeting, but it could be the a committee, such as a subcommittee of the Council. So, I mean, I feel comfortable with number one, with the understanding we could go to public safety and then bring it to the Council.
